On April 8th, 2024, Toledo area residents prepared for a total eclipse. Friends and families gathered together to wait for the moment of complete darkness. Visitors from across the United States arrived in the Toledo region to experience the darkness of a complete total eclipse which lasted approximately 1 minute and 53 seconds. Specialized glasses must be worn during the eclipse and can only be removed when totality occurs to avoid damage to the eyes. The next total eclipse that is visible from Canada and the United States will occur in the year of 2044, making this event a unique and memorable one.

What is a total eclipse?

☀️ End of partial eclipse 4:26PM

A total solar eclipse happens when the moon passes between the sun and the earth, completely blocking the face of the sun. When viewing the eclipse from locations on earth where moon's shadow completely covers the sun, this is known as the path of totality and will experience a total solar eclipse. As long as weather and cloud coverage is clear, those that are along the path of totality will see the sun's corona, or outer atmosphere, which is usually obscured by the bright face of the sun.

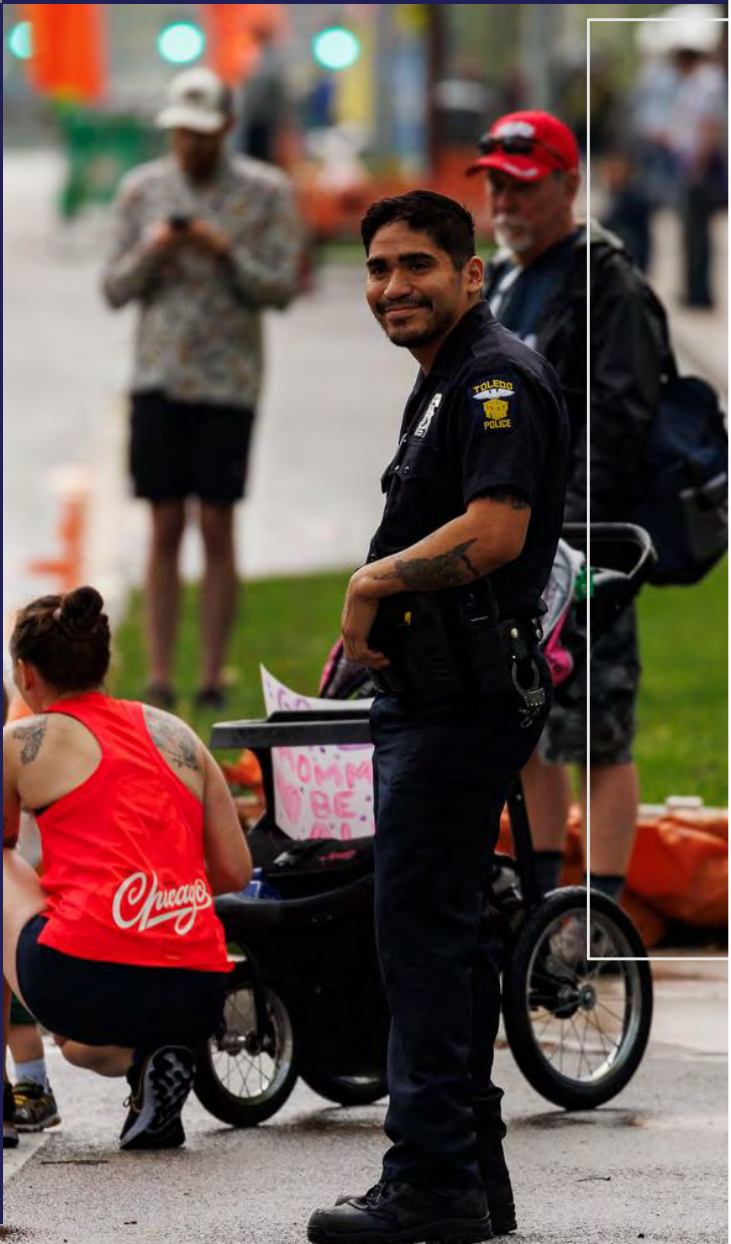

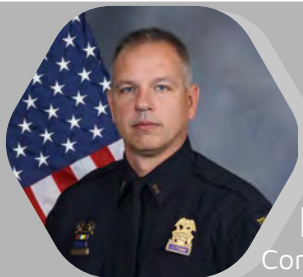

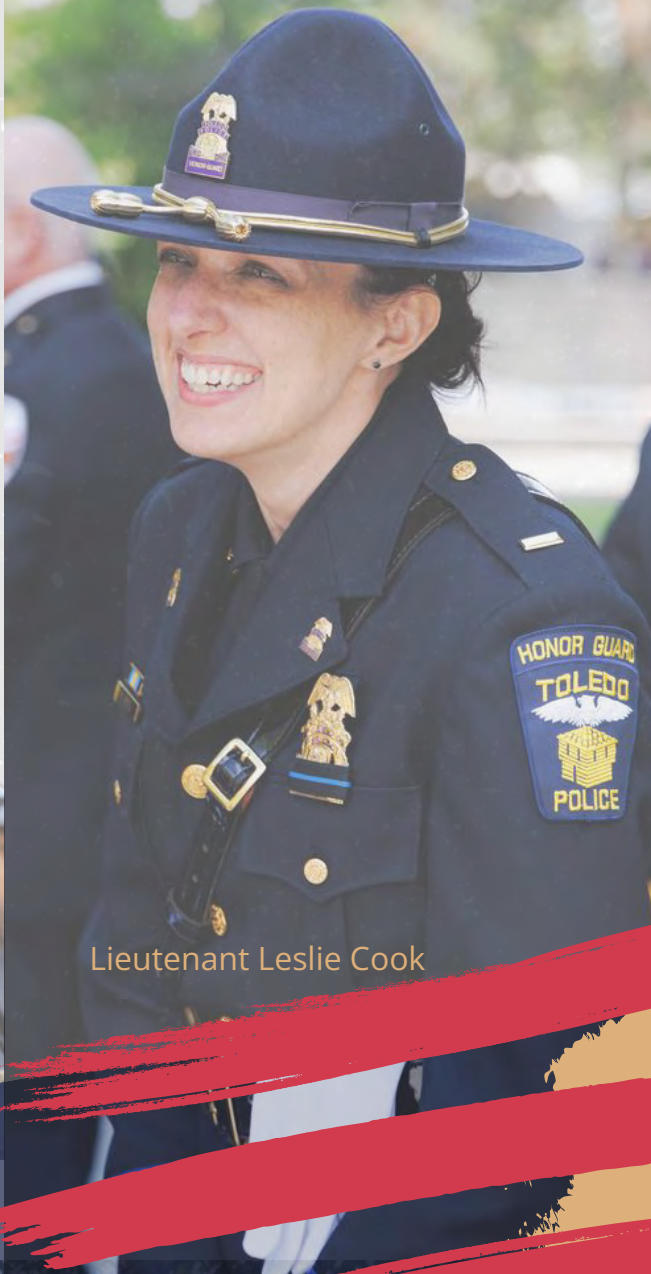

Letter of Recognition

On June 10, 2023, officers were speaking to a suicidal male who was sitting on the edge of the Martin Luther King Bridge when Sergeant Killen arrived. Unbeknownst to the male, Sergeant Killen positioned himself directly behind him at a distance. Officers continued to negotiate, however, the male kept repeating that he was going to kill himself and was inching towards the edge of the ledge. Sergeant Killen seized an opportunity while the male was distracted to run up behind him, jump up the backside of the wall, grab him and pull him backwards off of the ledge and onto the ground. The male was then transported to psychiatric care.

Letter of Recognition

On June 11, 2023, officers again responded to the Martin Luther King Bridge for a distraught juvenile standing on the ledge deciding whether or not to jump. Officer Wynn immediately began attempting to calm the juvenile and develop a rapport, but got no response. The juvenile walked along the ledge to get farther away from Officer Wynn and entered into a fenced off section of the bridge. Officer Wynn jumped the fence to keep visual contact with the young man and continued encouraging him to get off of the ledge and talk. The male was not receptive to anything being said so Officer Wynn got up on the ledge himself and continued negotiating, while moving closer. When Officer Wynn was close enough he grabbed the juvenile and pulled him backwards off of the ledge. The juvenile was then taken to psychiatric care.

Letter of Recognition

On October 26, 2023, Officer Patrick Fisher and his partner Officer James Parker were on patrol when they noticed a suspect carrying what appeared to be a firearm in the front pocket of his sweatshirt. The officers approached the suspect to investigate and he fled on foot. Officer Fischer pursued him on foot while Officer Parker got into the patrol vehicle and gave chase. Officer Fischer chased the suspect and briefly lost sight of him around a building. Officer Fischer continued running and came around the building where he was met by the suspect who had doubled back and was running directly at him with the weapon pointed at Officer Fischer. Officer Fischer was forced to perform a difficult task and engage the suspect in defense of himself and others.

Letter of Recognition

On September 30, 2023, officers were dispatched to a person shot at the intersection of Albert Street and White Street. Officers Novas and Pierce arrived prior to Toledo Fire and Rescue and found an unconscious male, who was breathing but unresponsive. The officers cut off the male's shirt and found that he was suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest. Officer Novas and Pierce worked together to get a chest seal applied to the wound. As Toledo Fire and Rescue arrived to tend to the victim, a witness informed the officers that he knew where the suspect had fled to. The officers then directed their attention to locating the suspect who was apprehended a short time later.

Letter of Recognition

On September 23, 2023, officers responded to a report of a person shot at the Circle K located at the intersection of Airport and Byrne. Officer Henry and Officer Wynn arrived to the Circle K before Toledo Fire and Rescue and found a female on the ground bleeding significantly from a gunshot wound to the neck. The officers immediately began treating that wound. Detective Macklin then arrived to assist and quickly located two additional gunshot wounds. Together they all worked to stabilize the victim and apply a tourniquet. These life saving measures assisted in the victim making a full recovery from a traumatic injury.

Letter of Recognition

On June 27, 2023, officers were at Front and I-280 when they attempted to stop a stolen mini-van. The driver sped into the intersection and collided with an oncoming SUV. Both vehicles spun from the impact. The mini-van came to rest and then caught on fire and the SUV rolled an unknown number of times. Officers called for Toledo Fire and Rescue to respond and quickly secured the suspect. Officer Manders then rushed to the SUV and found the driver conscious, but with a significant injury to her arm. Without hesitation, Officer Manders applied a tourniquet while calming the driver. Toledo Fire and Rescue arrived to transport the driver to the hospital and stated that without the tourniquet being applied so quickly the blood loss would have been life threatening.

Letter of Recognition

On July 11, 2023, Officer Wittman attempted to stop a reckless driver who refused to comply. The driver fled and lost control of his vehicle, striking another motorist and knocking down power lines. Officer Wittmann called for Toledo Fire and Rescue while rushing to check on the occupants of the other vehicle. One motorist was found to be bleeding from an arm injury and Officer Wittmann applied a tourniquet to render aid. The suspect was caught a short time later.

Command Officer of the Year

Sgt. Przybylski is a cornerstone leader of the Toledo Police Department. On Central midnight shift, she is an involved supervisor who leads her crews from the front. She supports and coaches her officers while holding them accountable. She leads by example, timely and professionally, reporting to work and handling her responsibilities. Nightly, Sgt. Przybylski responds to calls with her officers, backs them up, and critiques them in a humble way that improves their performance and increases their safety.

One of the trademarks of a great leader and supervisor is earning the respect of those you supervise. Sgt. Przybylski has clearly done that, one of her officers offered the following words about her, "Sgt. Przybylski has been my Sergeant since I started my career in 2012. Since that time, she has always been willing to answer questions and always makes herself available even when she is not. She will go to bat for her officers and will stand her ground for her officers. She treats everyone with respect. She always backs up her crews, acts as another officer, and will always lend a helping hand when you need it. If you look up the definition of a leader, the role of a leader is to coach, guide, and inspire others, a picture of Sgt. Cheryl Przybylski would be next to it."

Jacquelyn was hired with the Toledo Police Department Records Division on March 4, 2016. During her career she has become very fluent and efficient in every task required or asked of her. Jacquelyn is very knowledgeable in her job duties and is often sought for advice and information from officers, co-workers, and citizens. On April 14, 2023, two suspects entered the Dollar General store at 828 Philips Ave. One of the suspects produced a handgun and pointed it at the cashier and two other customers who were inside the store. After stealing a book bag from one of the customers, the suspects exited the store and fled into the neighborhood. Sergeant Jason Onstead observed one of the suspects running through the yards in the adjacent neighborhood and pursued. The suspect fired his handgun at Sergeant Onstead, striking his nearby patrol car. Sergeant Onstead lost sight of the suspect, but calmly relayed to the area crews that the suspect had fired a shot at him and gave the direction that the suspect was fleeing.

After a short time, the suspect was relocated by area crews in the yard of 4246 Vermaas Avenue and a perimeter was established. Negotiations commenced with the suspect, in an attempt to get him to surrender the firearm that he was still brandishing. The negotiations were unsuccessful and the suspect raised the firearm at the officers. The officers were forced to perform the most difficult task a police officer will ever have to perform and engaged the suspect. This action was necessary to protect themselves, their fellow officers and the crowded community area in which the event culminated.

On January 25, 2023, officers were dispatched to a report of shots fired at a home in the 5700 block of Hill Avenue. While enroute, they were informed that the female caller and her son were barricaded in a bedroom. Her husband had fired his gun inside of the home and was in a state of psychosis. The female and her son were trying to get outside and ended up getting out on a portion of the roof through a window. Officers arrived and were able to get them to safety. The suspect then came outside carrying a shotgun. Officers attempted to negotiate with him, however, he refused to drop the weapon as he walked around the property. He then began walking down the street, through neighbors' yards with officers following. Officers continued to negotiate to no avail. The suspect turned and began walking back towards them, raised the shotgun and pointed it at the officers. The officers were forced to perform a difficult task and engaged the suspect in defense of themselves and others.

Citizens Police Academy

2024



On May 17th, 2024 another citizen academy graduated with a better understanding of the profession and the difficulties associated with policing the public. The purpose of this academy is to enhance the relationships between police and the community. Members of the Academy Staff and officers of the Toledo Police Department joined together to host this academy. With strong partnerships within the community, the more we can accomplish together, the more we can deter crime. During this abbreviated version of the Toledo Police Academy, participants received training in subjects that vary from criminal law to the use of deadly force. At the end of the academy, each participant was awarded their diploma by the Chief of Police.

What are the participating Guidelines?

- Over 21 years of Age
- Must pass the criminal history background check
- Must attend 80% of the sessions
- Must complete and submit a written application form
- Groups will be selected for maximum community diversity
- Class size limited to 25 participants

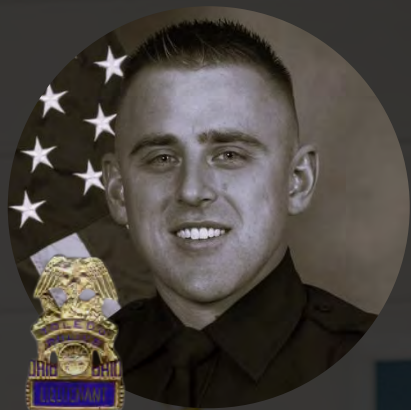

On June 7th, 2024, the start of the 71st Toledo Police Academy class began and 37 cadets began the process of becoming one of Toledo's finest! The next six months will determine if they have what it takes to withstand the training required to become an officer.

From the 46th Academy Class to the 71st Academy Class

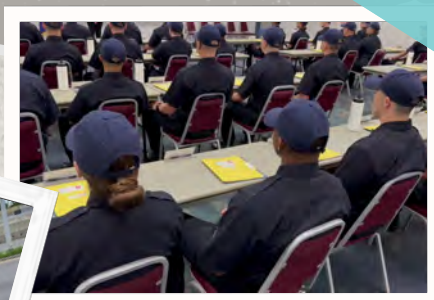
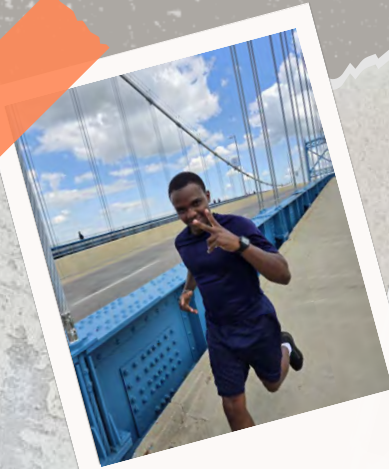


On June 7th, 2024 the 71st Toledo Police Academy officially began, making it another memorable class in the department's history. Noah Dressel, the son of fallen Detective Keith Dressel, is a cadet in this class. Noah Dressel was only four years old when his father was taken away from him. Following in his father's footsteps has been a mission for Noah and this is the day he starts that mission.

Detective Keith Dressel was hired December 10th, 1993 and was a member of the 46th Toledo Police Academy Class. He would have been working through his 30th year on the department the year his son, Noah Dressel, was hired. In the early morning of February 21, 2007, Vice Detective Keith Dressel was shot near 722 Bush Street. The gunshot ultimately took his life. Detective Dressel was on foot chasing a juvenile suspect, when the suspect struck Keith in the chest with a single bullet. He was working on his 14th year with the Toledo Police Department and was only 35 years old when he was killed.

Live with good memories, not with unfulfilled dreams



The tradition continues for the 71st academy class with a long run across the Anthony Wayne Bridge, also known as the High Level Bridge. Every single day, these cadets test not only their physical abilities but also their mental fitness. It takes mental toughness to continue to push their bodies physically. This ability is an important trait for police officers conducting their everyday duties.

History of the AW Bridge

The Anthony Wayne Bridge spans the Maumee River connecting the east side of Toledo to the rest of the city. City Council eventually voted to build this bridge and voters approved a \$3 million bond issue to pay for its construction. Voters approved the issue in November of 1928 and the construction of the bridge began. It was completed by 1931. The total length of this bridge is 3,218 feet and it used vertical steel ropes to transfer its weight. Its roadway is approximately 106 feet above the river to allow lake freighters to pass below. The bridge is the only remaining suspension bridge maintained by ODOT and it has had three major rehabilitation projects.

OHIO LAW ENFORCEMENT COMPETITION



June 19th, 2024

The Heart of Ohio Law Enforcement Competition is an annual event where Police Explorers and Public Safety Cadets compete against each other in police-related scenarios. This year's competition was hosted locally and is the first time Toledo has hosted the Heart of Ohio competition. Both explorers and cadets are graded on handling each scenario, competing for top rankings. To be eligible for the program, cadets must be 14-21 years old and maintain a 2.0 grade point average. Cadets shall not have any arrests or convictions involving felonies, crimes of violence, drug offenses, or association with any gang or criminal group.

Each time, Jeron was integrated back into the civilian lifestyle and transitioned back into his employment as an officer with the Toledo Police Department.

TOTAL AVERAGE MILEAGE OF PATROL VEHICLES



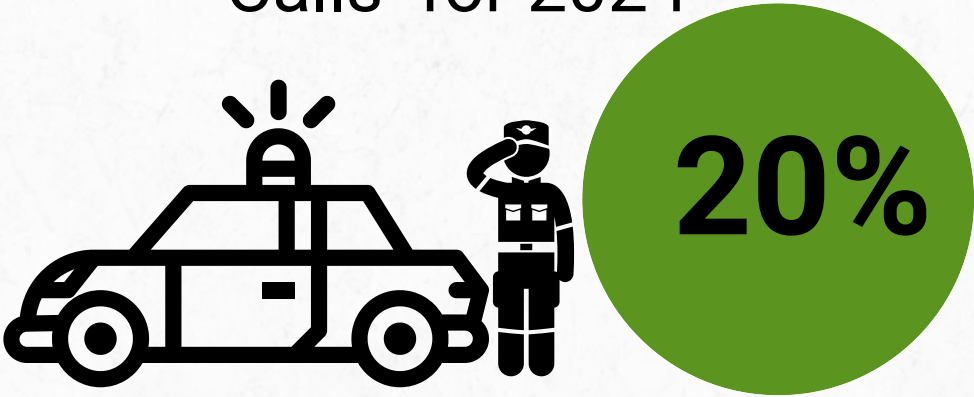
